

# LAST WEEK'S GOOD BEHAVIOUR RAFFLE WINNERS

I read an interesting article in the Herald Sun on Monday. I thought that I would include it as a conversation starter.

# THE PRICE FOR OUR HEADS

Addressing the crisis in recruitment and retention of school principals is urgent, experts warn, pointing to stress, burnout and intense workloads.

A study led by Monash University's Faculty of Education aims to reveal the "invisible challenges" facing principals that push many "to the brink".

It is gathering the testimonies of principals in public schools to study the issues and emotional demands they face.

Lead researcher Jane Wilkinson said work was needed to address principals' workloads.

"It's the emotionally draining nature of the work, the 'hard' hours where principals are dealing with more and more demanding, emotionally intense situations as they support troubled staff, students and parents," she said.

Professor Wilkinson said principals had to deal with high levels of anxiety and stress. "This includes children's behaviour, particular kids who are acting out in anti-social ways," she said. One former principal who took part in the survey said he could still feel the bruises on his ankle as he recounted a child who used to act out and kick him daily. He could still feel the pain six years later."

Chief investigator Lucas Walsh added these stressful encounters could lead to "chronic stress, burnout and low job satisfaction".

The three-year project funded by the Australian Research Council will aim to improve leadership preparation and development for principals.

A Victorian principal of almost 20 years said the job had taken a "serious toll" on his mental health.

"I've had students attack me and my staff," he said. "There's been instances of angry parents abusing me over the phone and via email, it can be very stressful. I also know of other principals that have been forced to go on WorkCover because of serious incidents."

Spensley Street Primary School principal Bec Spink said the job involved a lot of "invisible labour". "This includes significant student mental health issues and incidents, many principals are seeing huge rises in school refusals and increasing threats of violence and abuse behaviour from community members," she said.

Retired school principal of 15 years Pitsa Binnion said most of a principal's time was spent dealing with "intense critical matters".

"You are always navigating difficult relationships and very complex matters," she said.

"All of it takes a toll. There is help available but you are intrinsically responsible and you're often left exhausted at the end of each year."

A recent survey found almost a third of Victorian principals had been physically attacked by students or parents.

Australian Education Union Victorian branch president Meredith Peace said despite the department's initiatives to support principals, workload and wellbeing remained a "critical problem".

"The chronic teacher shortage in Victoria has exacerbated this problem as principals have been forced to shoulder additional teaching and administrative responsibilities, pushing them to the brink," she said.

The article is quite negative in nature and, while I can identify with a few of the concerns, I consider myself very lucky that I work at Reservoir West Primary School.

The workload does result in me experiencing stress on occasions, but I would never consider myself 'burnt-out' or 'pushed to the brink'. I am in the two-thirds of Principals who never been physically assaulted by a student or parent.

Yes, I have been abused by parents either in person or over the phone during my nineteen years in the role, but I could count those instances on one hand (and have developed a thick skin).

The role is emotionally demanding, as are all roles when working in a school. School staff and especially teachers have to deal with tricky relationships and complex matters and incidents and being the Principal, the buck stops with me.

However, I am very lucky in quite a few ways. When I speak with Principals and teachers who work at other schools, compared to what I often hear, our school has:

- An outstandingly positive and supportive parent cohort that appreciates what the school is doing for their children
- An outstandingly positive and respectful student cohort that is overwhelmingly connected and engaged to the school and their learning
- An outstandingly professional and nurturing teaching staff that values each student and prioritises teamwork and communication
- An outstanding Wellbeing Team that goes over and above for students and families that need support – I would like to suggest that they are the best in the business
- An extensive leadership structure that supports me and makes my job so much easier the structure is set out below

All of the above points lead to a very strong culture – one where all students are valued, concerns and issues are dealt with fairly and in a timely manner, academic achievement is prioritised but not at the expense of student wellbeing and parents are encouraged to be involved in the school

However, I do have bad days every now and then, but they are heavily outweighed by the good ones. Many of the good ones are directly caused by the students, parents and teachers, as well as the amazing leaders below:

#### NATIONAL AND STATE NAPLAN RESULTS

Here is a letter I received this morning from Dr David Howes, from the Deputy Secretary of the Department of Education which I was asked to pass on to our community:

Dear parents and carers,

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) assessments held earlier this year had a very high participation rate from Victorian students, with participation levels returning to pre-COVID levels.

Last month, families with children in grades 3 or 5 or years 7 or 9 who participated in the assessments received their results through an individual NAPLAN report. Today, the statewide results have been released, and I am pleased to have this opportunity to provide some information about Victoria's performance.

There are a total of 20 tests each year across grades 3 and 5 and years 7 and 9 that assess student achievement in reading, writing, numeracy, spelling, grammar and punctuation. Of the 20 tests, Victorian was ranked first or second in 16, more than any other state or territory, and an improvement on the 2022 results when the equivalent figure was 12.

NAPLAN results for Grade 3 are of particular importance because the first 3 years of schooling establish the foundation for further success. Victorian Grade 3 students achieved the highest results in the country for both reading and numeracy.

In secondary schools, Victoria had the lowest proportion of students needing additional support in both years 7 and 9 in both reading and numeracy compared to all other states and territories.

The results have also highlighted the fact that we need to continue our efforts to close the gap between advantaged and disadvantaged students.

While Aboriginal students in Victoria achieved higher results on average than in other states and territories, the gap between the performance of Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal students is still too large, as is the gap between the average performance of metropolitan students and that of regional students.

Overall, however, while we are clearly focused on the areas where further improvement is needed, these are excellent results. They are a tribute to the outstanding work of teachers, principals and staff in the schools across our state.

No one would suggest our schools are perfect. Education is always an unfinished business. But on the evidence of today's release of the statewide NAPLAN results, Victorian teachers and school principals are doing a great job.

Dr David Howes Deputy Secretary, Schools and Regional Services I received a text from a very excited Assistant Principal of Teaching and Learning (who doesn't work on Wednesdays) this morning informing me that Reservoir West Primary School was above the state results in every area regarding the percentage of students that were rated as Exceeding or Strong. This is great news for our school and shows that our improvement journey using explicit instruction is beginning to bear fruit.

A couple of weeks ago I included a table showing the school's 2023 NAPLAN results compared to similar schools and schools in the Yarra/Darebin area. This week the table includes Reservoir West's results compared to the state.

It's funny how the media can once again extract a gloom and doom perspective, loudly shouting that one third of students are failing to meet NAPLAN benchmarks, whilst David Howes is pushing how well Victorian students and schools are doing. I like the glass half-full approach although at Reservoir West we ensure that the students who need additional support are provided with evidence-based programs to help them improve in literacy and numeracy.

The 2023 results are below. Once again, I'd like to bring your attention to the Year 3 results, most of which are significantly higher than those of the state.

I'm pretty pleased with our progress and looking forward to even greater results in future years.


#### PERSUASIVE WRITING








# **NUMERACY**

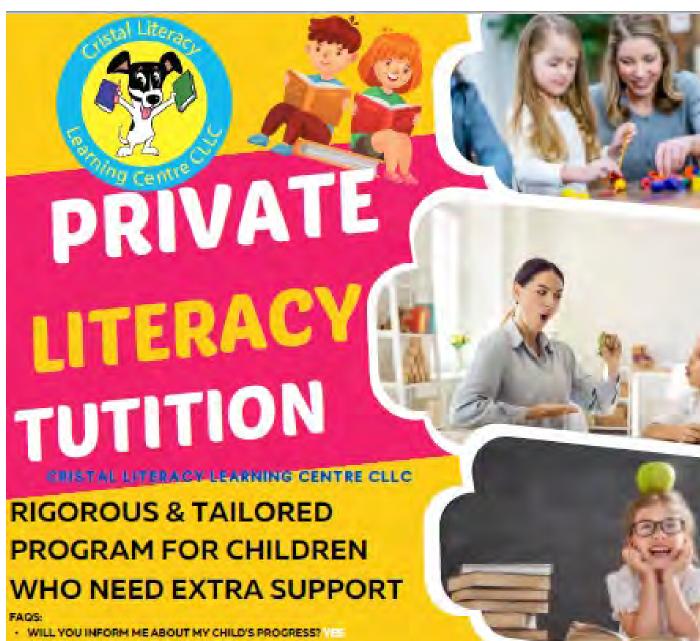
