# **REMINDER - SAFETY IS KEY! RWPS CARPARK AREAS**



It has come to my attention that our school community members are continuing to utilise the staff carparking areas as a walkway. ### PAY IT FORWARD TRIP TO VANUATU - REPORT FROM IRIS THOMPSON

### Note

Parents, please note the below item contains information about female period hygiene. If your child usually reads the Newsletter with you, please read through the item beforehand and make your own decision if it is okay for your child to read/listen to.

Hi everyone,

I have just returned from a 10 day 'Pay it Forward Trip' to Vanuatu. It was everything that I thought it would be and so much more! It turned into a 14day trip because of problems with Air Vanuatu - I wasn't complaining about the extended stay! I will never forget this trip. I have never been overseas, so it was a real eye/mind opener. We got to throw ourselves into a completely different culture. More than ever, I respect other people's perspectives and am significantly more tolerant of tough situations. We witnessed the more difficult aspects of living in the tropics that the people of Yakel endure every day. Things that the tourists don't see. I am so grateful now for the conveniences I have at home that I've taken for granted; showers, warm water, easy access to medicines and drinking water.

The trip was hard work, but so rewarding. Many people have asked me to write about my trip and show some photos. Before I do this, I'll give you a quick run-down as to why I went, and I really want to thank some special people first.

I had the opportunity to attend this 'Paying it Forward' trip with Rotary in the September school holidays. There were 8 girls attending like me between the ages of 16-18 years. We each had a mentor who was with us the entire time. All our mentors were studying at university. I was the youngest participant at 15 years old.



We worked with 'Bridging Health' an awesome group of volunteers with various qualifications. These volunteers have participated in this trip a few times, this time allowing us to make amazing connections with the locals on the island Tanna. We ran 'Days for Girls' programs where we explained what period undies are and how to use them. We discussed women's health issues with the local women. We held 'ear and wound' care sessions and sometimes urgent triage decisions were made resulting in people needing to go straight to hospital.

It was such a privilege to volunteer in a traditional village, in the 'Custom Village' which was the

local meeting place. This was an incredibly rare opportunity. People were wearing traditional clothing and about 100 patients were waiting to see us on arrival on our first day. Most of these people hadn't seen a doctor in over a year. The people we treated had cold and flu symptoms, fungal infections, and scabies.

Before I continue, I quickly want to thank a few people. If Mr. Kearney (Bruce) didn't let me organise a raffle in June at RWPS, I would have struggled raising the \$500 needed by each participant. Rotary used this money to purchase the school supplies needed for the students (solar powered study lamps, books and stationery). If my wonderful past teachers and ES staff didn't donate to the hampers, there would be no raffle. If my amazing Mum didn't attend a warehouse sale at Elk and provide the Elk items and my dad didn't include his Gin, the hampers couldn't



have been as valuable. If all the beautiful RWPS families didn't buy raffle tickets, there would be no money raised – I am very aware some students used their pocket money to help me. So many friends and family members very generously purchased lots of raffle tickets which contributed to me raising my donation target. Parents of my Preston High School friends, everyone, I can't tell you how grateful I am to you all. Thank you to the RWPS ES staff for selling the tickets at school assemblies. I paid for half of my trip myself, my parents helped me with the remainder. Not one dollar of the raised money went to any of my expenses. All the money raised went to supply children living on the island of Tanna, with school supplies.

Back in June, Miss Caddy helped to organise my flyers in the background. Coburg West employed me to be their lizard expert in their holiday programs and I supplied them with stick insects for their insect program. Our local cafes and chemist in Gilbert Road got on board, all contributing to the hampers. All these things made Vanuatu happen.

Back to Vanuatu, it is one of the most beautiful places on earth. They burn most of their rubbish and unfortunately lots of rubbish ends up in their waterways. We worked alongside 'Bridging Health' to help the local teenage girls have a better understanding of how their bodies worked and period hygiene. It was hoped that the Western girls my age would be able to make a bigger impact and could make the girls on the island feel more comfortable talking about their bodies and how strong and beautiful they are. To empower other girls my age, I thought, was an absolute privilege.

Each of us could only take 5kg of hand luggage for ourselves for the trip (I won't lie, I battled with this!). This was all we needed. Each of us also took a 23kg suitcase filled to the brim with donated items. Each suitcase was then left on the island with a young girl's family as a donation for when they finished primary school and needed the suitcase to leave the island to go to boarding school. A huge thank you to the Vecchio family for donating x2 large suitcases. Each of us planned to fill the donated suitcase with bamboo toothbrushes or period undies. I chose period undies.

Most of you are probably unaware, like I was, that when girls get their periods in Vanuatu, menstruation is considered very un-clean. Menstruating women are not allowed to touch their family's food or dishes and they are expected to keep away from other people. Young girls are often asked to sleep outside the house alone and are only allowed to sit on pieces of cardboard in case they dirty chairs.

Talking about menstruation is a taboo topic. Mothers and other family members have spent a lifetime time not discussing women's health with their own daughters. Mothers don't even have a good understanding of how their own bodies work. It was only when we had translated the questions we received on ripped pieces of paper during the sessions, we realised how little the girls knew. Bridging Health is helping to change the lives of young woman through great education and on this trip, they were wanting to trial bringing teenage western girls with them to help. We helped distribute hygiene kits and helped to teach the girls about how period undies work. This gave the girls confidence. After our visit they wouldn't have to worry about how to buy their next lot of disposal pads. The pristine environment of Vanuatu will also be better preserved.

In the months before my departure, I contacted 13 companies explaining my trip and asking if they would like to donate period undies. Four companies, with amazing women running the show, couldn't wait to donate. These companies were EMREN, NICKER BOT, I LOVE LUNA and MODI BODI. I was donated over 500 pairs of period undies from these amazing companies. That's over \$12,000 worth! I was so, so grateful. To the ladies in Management that made these decisions to help me - please know how much you have changed the lives of women/girls on Tanna. It gives me goose bumps writing this, because I saw their faces when we explained to them what they are and what they are used for. It felt so good being able to help others at 15 years of age. Without these amazing women helping me, I couldn't fill my suitcase. It honestly made my heart sing, knowing how much these ladies wanted to help our cause.

There was a movie made in 2017 about the island Tanna and its people. It's called 'Tanna: two tribes. One love', you can stream it on SBS. It gives you a great insight into what this beautiful island looks like and what its people are like. It won a couple of awards. Google: 'Tanna Featurette'. It will give you a look behind the scenes and what the movie is about. Thank you once again to everyone who was involved. You have essentially all helped improve the lives of women on Tanna and created a life changing experience for me that I will never forget. Thank you so much. I hope you enjoy the photos.

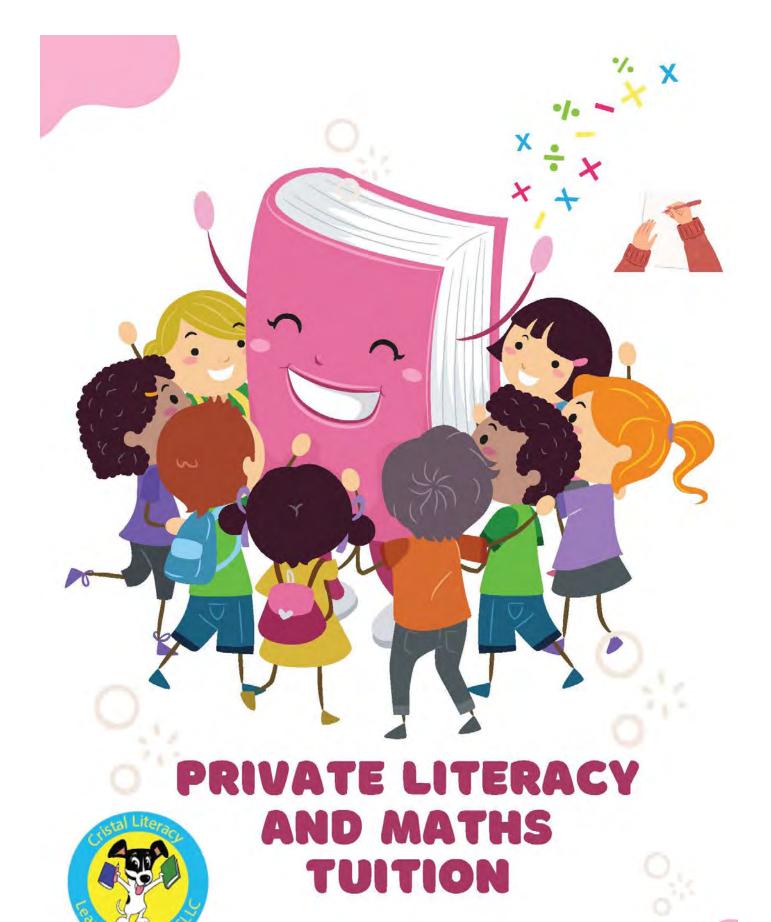

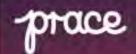
