Dear Parents, Students and Friends,

I would sincerely like to thank all of the families that have taken the time to complete the school's Parent Survey over the last five weeks. I apologise for banging on about it, but I have been really pleased with the take-up and particularly pleased with the results.

We have had 186 responses which equates to 43% of our families. I have included the results below. The tables set out the 2023 results as the percentage of families that have responded:

- Positive chose Agree or Strongly Agree
- Neutral Neither Agree or Disagree
- Negative chose Disagree or Strongly Disagree

The column on the far right shows how many positive responses were received in 2022 and as you can see, there has been a significant improvement in nearly all of the factors.

The percentages highlighted in green, amber and red show the 2023 heading average compared to 2022 heading average.

- Green means an improvement in 2023
- Amber means the percentage remained the same in 2023
- Red means a decline in 2023

All bar two of the areas showed an improvement in 2023. The one area that declined was that of Non-experience of Bullying, but only by one percentage point. However, I'm not really sure that that is a valid response – either this year or in 2022. According to the parents who completed the survey, one in three of the students attending the school have recently been bullied. If that was the case, the Wellbeing Team, the teachers and the leadership team would be doing little else but sorting out such issues.

I am thinking that the cause of this response could be one of the following:

- Students may not be reporting all bullying incidents to staff but telling their parents
- Students may not understand the correct meaning of the word 'bullying' and be reporting
 to their parents that they have been bullied at school, when in fact it may have been a
 negative interaction with another student or students
- Parents may not understand the correct meaning of the word 'bullying' as above

One very good definition of bullying was provided to students in Years 4, 5 and 6 while they were completing the student survey earlier this year:

Bullying is when someone who has an advantage (such as being stronger or more popular) hurts another person on purpose and does so often or repeatedly. Bullying can occur in different ways, such as verbal (e.g. name calling), social (e.g. leaving someone out of things), physical (e.g. hitting or kicking), or cyber (e.g. on social media).

I have highlighted a couple of other 2023 responses in purple as they may need further discussion and investigation as those percentages were significantly lower than most of the other factors.

At the end of the week, you will receive your child's Term 3 Effort and Behaviour Progress Report via Compass.

Effort and Behaviour Progress Reports provide parents/carers and students with a succinct picture of a student's progress relating to their effort and behaviour at school.

Term 3 Effort and Behaviour Progress Reports

The Term 3 Effort and Behaviour Progress Report will display Effort and Behaviour on a grid and graphs for subjects taught during Term 3 and are comparable with Term 1 and 2. Teachers will again use school-created matrices to make judgements about each student's level of effort and behaviour in each subject area taught in Term 3. Matrices will be sent out via Compass on Friday with instructions of how to access reports.

Teachers will decide if a child's effort and behaviour is:

- 10 Excellent
- 8 Very Good
- 6 Good
- 4 Satisfactory
- 2 Unsatisfactory
- 0 Not Applicable

Scores 1,3,5,7 and 9 do not have a category. This is due to limitations with setting up reports using Compass.

Please note:

- Term 3 Effort and Behaviour Progress Reports do not indicate levels of academic achievement.
- School Yard Behaviour is only scored for behaviour and will appear as NA 0 (Not Applicable) for Effort.
- If NA 0 (Not Applicable) appears on your child's progress report, the reason may be due to a long-term absence, exemption from the subject, low attendance for the subject, your child is in a composite class and subjects also appear for the other year level, or in accordance with the school's teaching and learning plan, the subject hasn't been taught for the term.

Time to Reflect



R U OK? DAY 2023

I'm Here to Hear because a conversation could change a life

R U OK? Day is an annual National Day of Action dedicated to reminding people to ask family, friends, and colleagues, 'Are you ok?'. This year's R U OK? Day falls on Thursday 14 September. The purpose is to inspire and empower everyone to connect meaningfully with people around them regularly to make a difference to anyone struggling. It's a way for us to reach out and demonstrate that we genuinely care. This year's message is "I'm Here to Hear" because a conversation could change a life. With life's ups and downs that challenge us all, the chances are you may know someone who is struggling. We don't need to wait until someone is visibly distressed to meaningfully ask them how they are really going. We encourage you to have wellbeing conversations with your children, family, friends or colleagues.



We encourage you to wear a splash of YELLOW on Thursday, 14th (it is not a free dress day – uniform still required) to remind us to be kind, assume positive intent, check in on someone and even ask for help ourselves. This year's classroom focus is on Friendships. Some questions you can ask your child are:

- How can you be a good listener for a friend?
- What type of friend do you want to be?
- When do you know if a friend needs help?
- Why are friendships important?

The Wellbeing Hub

What happens in the Wellbeing Hub? The Wellbeing Hub is a safe and inclusive space used by our RWPS community in a variety of ways. Below is a list of just a few of the things that happen in The Hub.

- Students sometimes come to The Hub to complete their learning in a quiet space; staff in the Wellbeing Hub often support the children with their learning;
- A Prayer Room is available for use by the students;
- The Hub is often buzzing during breaks with an awesome train-set, drawing, Uno, building blocks, reading, writing and chatting some of the favourite activities;
- Psychologist sessions conducted by Seven Hats Psychology on a Tuesday;
- External service providers attend onsite for sessions with children. We continue to welcome Speech Therapists, Occupational Therapists, Psychologists and a variety of other support workers;
- Deadly Club often use the space for their meetings;
- RWPS is very fortunate to have a space such as The Hub with feedback from visiting professionals always very positive and often humbling – BIG THANKS TO THE AMAZING STAFF

AND STUDENTS THAT HELP TO MAKE THE WELLBEING HUB SUCH A HIT WITH EVERYONE THAT VISITS AND/OR USES IT!!

boomerangs are planned to be part of a display, although many of the kids really wanted to take them home and share their art with their families.










